





Our favourites in 2022

Bibi, who had skin problems and anxiety, was not accepted by the other animals in the family.




YETI



"So far, 2022 has been keeping us busy! From January to June, we took in nearly 6,700 animals. That's an average of nearly 37 animals per day—an increase of 8.5% over the last two years.
