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MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear friends of animals,

Every year brings new challenges-and new hopes. In my second year as Executive Director, I've had the privilege of working alongside dedicated teams and volunteers committed to defending animal welfare and raising public awareness-not just in Montréal, but across all of Québec.

And what a year it's been! In 2024, we saw a record number of animal admissions, surpassing the average of the past five years. In response, and to help curb this surge, we focused our efforts on several key animal protection issues.

Beyond being a shelter, we are developing innovative solutions to reverse the trend-such as our abandonment prevention and shelter diversion program, as well as our growing community initiatives. More and more, we're working with the community, for the community.

Our commitment to fighting animal cruelty remains steadfast. Accredited by the Ministry of Public Security, our Investigations Department constables enforce the Criminal Code's animal cruelty provisions across Québec. In 2024, we scaled up our operations significantly, doubling the number of animals seized compared to 2023, and expanding our reach beyond Montréal to areas like Mauricie, Abitibi, and Montérégie.

We're also advocating for legislative progress, such as the adoption of Bill 67, which now allows veterinarians working in non-profit organizations to provide care directly to the public's animals. Thanks to this update to the *Code des professions*, we'll soon be able to offer more accessible veterinary care to low-income families.

Like you, we believe these collective efforts are building a more inclusive society—one where animals truly belong. On behalf of the 13,076 animals rescued in 2024 thanks to your support: thank you.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD

In 2024, the Montréal SPCA continued to play a vital role for animals in need those who are abused, neglected, or abandoned. The organization remains a leading voice for animals in Québec, not only as a shelter, but also as a powerful advocate for animal rights.

Its vision of a more inclusive world for animals came to life through the permanent adoption of the *Fido in the Metro* pilot project. Dogs are now officially allowed on the metro year-round—a win that sets the stage for similar access on bus networks in municipalities across Québec. Public support for this initiative was overwhelming, proof that society is ready to welcome animals more fully into shared spaces. For the same reason, the SPCA continues to push for the elimination of "no-pet" clauses in rental leases. It is also urging the Québec government to ensure its upcoming family law reform takes animals' best interests into account in cases of separation or divorce.

Beyond its programs to prevent abandonment, the Montréal SPCA is also working upstream through its *Compassion Education Program*, which teaches children kindness and empathy toward all animals—a crucial step in building a more just future.

These achievements are the result of tireless work, years of advocacy, and the strength of a united community. With 156 years of experience behind it, the Montréal SPCA is as determined as ever to move its mission forward. I extend my heartfelt thanks to everyone making this progress possible.



- 4,934 animals adopted (a 7.6% increase over 2023, including a 38.2% rise in dog adoptions)
- 2,127 animals sterilized at our permanent Mittens High-Volume Spay/Neuter Clinic
- 1,383 animals placed in foster homes
- 885 cats sterilized through our Trap-Neuter-Return-Maintain (TNRM) Program
- 360 animals reunited with their families
- 380 animals transferred to partner shelters and sanctuaries
- 48 animals received from partner shelters and sanctuaries

Veterinary care provided

- 22,936 exams (an average of 63 per day)
- 6,090 sterilizations (24 per day on average)
- 399 dental procedures (about 3 every 2 days)
- 124 complex surgeries (1 every 2 days on average)



TOGETHER, WE'RE SHIFTING THE BASELINE



ANIMAL ADVOCACY

Since 1869, the Montreal SPCA has stood out as a key political actor contributing to the evolution of Québec and Canadian society in the area of animal protection. Our deep commitment to defending animals of all species is a defining characteristic of our organization.

The Montreal SPCA's Animal Advocacy team fought many battles in 2024 to strengthen animal protection and played a major role in securing important victories for animals across Québec

Here are some of the most significant achievements in 2024

- In February 2024, the **Regulation on the Welfare and Safety of Companion Domestic Animals and Equines** came into effect, banning declawing of cats, cropping of dogs' ears and tails, as well as the use of gas chambers and prong collars, while also tightening rules around animal sales and breeding.
- The City of Montréal committed to seriously evaluating the feasibility of sterilization or contraception of deer in the East. For the first time in Québec, an authority with decision-making power has shown a clear willingness to implement fertility reduction methods as part of responsible wildlife management.
- We secured the support of Québec's three provincial opposition parties and a commitment from the Minister of Justice regarding the adoption of a provision on animal custody in cases of separation, requiring courts to consider the animal's best interests.

INVESTIGATIONS DEPARTMENT

The Montreal SPCA's Investigations Department plays a crucial role in the fight against animal cruelty. Led by Alain Tessier, a former police lieutenant-detective, our team of investigators and special constables is on the ground every day—responding to reports across Québec, enforcing laws, and protecting animals from acts punishable by law.

2024 was a year of major progress. We implemented a new risk assessment and intelligence management tool, which has improved the efficiency of our interventions and increased safety for our teams. We also introduced **Radar Police**, a software that streamlines communication with police services by standardizing infraction codes.

In collaboration with the École nationale de police du Québec (ENPQ), we launched a customized training program in winter 2024. This initiative is enhancing our teams' expertise in investigation techniques, social intervention, legal matters, and more.

A new agreement with Cheval Québec now allows us to respond more quickly and effectively to reports of horse cruelty throughout the province.

Protecting animals isn't just our mission—it's a responsibility we carry out with discipline, compassion, and composure, day in and day out.

HELPING ANIMAL IN DISTRESS

Collaboration at the Heart of Our Reception and Patrol Teams' Values

A reassuring voice on the other end of the line can make all the difference in an emergency. The Montreal SPCA's reception and patrol service plays a crucial role in responding to animalrelated emergencies. Available from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m., seven days a week, our team is the first point of contact for those who, faced with an animal in distress, take the noble step of wanting to help.

At reception, we provide much more than information: we offer personalized advice, tailored resources, and, when needed, coordinate the rescue of animals in trouble. Our patrol officers—true everyday heroes—respond on the ground, at the request of authorities or concerned citizens, to rescue stray, injured, or lost animals. Their mission? To act guickly, professionally, and with compassion to give every rescued animal a better future.

This strong chain of solidarity begins with the call received at our reception and continues through the actions taken in the field. The result? Animals secured, people relieved... and above all, a renewed chance at survival for every living being we encounter. Because every action counts, and every life is worth saving.

ABANDONMENT PREVENTION AND SHELTER STAY **REDUCTION PROGRAM**

What if we could avoid time spent in cages?

The Montreal SPCA innovates by offering concrete resources to prevent shelter stays, significantly reducing the stress animals experience.

Opening the dialogue and offering compassionate listening

Sometimes families don't really want to give up their companion but run out of options. Our abandonment prevention team helps people keep their animals at home.

535 families supported through food donations, behavioural advice, low-cost sterilizations and veterinary care, and just through listening and encouragement!

Becoming a foster family for your own pet while we find a new home

We offer families the option to temporarily foster their own animal during the search for a new adopter. A medical exam is conducted and necessary care is provided.




Temporarily hosting lost or injured animals

To reduce stress for lost or injured pets, we allow caring citizens who find them to temporarily host these animals at home. We provide all necessary support: food, supplies, basic care, and parasite treatment. This creates a safe environment while waiting for adoption and enables active community involvement.

Encouraging direct adoption between individuals

Whenever possible, we facilitate direct adoptions between private individuals after verifying the animal's health and ensuring sterilization if needed. In 2024, 20 animals found new homes



CLINICAL PROGRAMS

The Montreal SPCA is home to over a hundred devoted staff and clinical programs rooted in the best practices of shelter medicine. Every treatment is tailored to the individual animal's needs—no matter the challenges they face—because every one of them deserves a full and healthy life.

Neonatal Program

Designed for orphaned kittens and puppies or those with fragile health, this program ensures that our most vulnerable animals get the best possible start in life.

Ringworm Program

Animals with this contagious skin condition are placed in specially trained foster homes to receive care, which also helps reduce the risk of transmission within the shelter.

Special Care Program

This program supports animals suffering from serious health conditions that require ongoing medical attention. Thanks to your donations, they receive expert, compassionate care that meets their complex needs.

Palliative Program

Because every animal deserves dignity at the end of life, this program provides comfort, medical support, and loving foster homes for animals in palliative care. They are cherished until the very end.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

The Montreal SPCA is a registered charity that relies primarily on public generosity to defend animal welfare. In 2024, donations accounted for 65% of our revenue—an essential support to meet the growing needs of animals in distress.

In total, **25,844** individuals chose to support our work through donations and other contributions, alongside **379** companies, foundations, and charitable organizations. Thanks to this exceptional mobilization, donation and contribution revenue increased by **24%** compared to 2023.

In 2024, **66** individuals also chose to extend their love for animals beyond their lifetime by bequeathing part of their estate to the SPCA. These planned gifts represented approximately **19%** of our resources. This precious gesture ensures the longterm continuity of our mission. The audited 2024 financial statements provide an accurate picture of our situation.


Our current assets total **\$7,261,099**, while current liabilities amount to **\$1,418,910**. Revenues reached **\$11,264,223**, with expenses totaling **\$11,919,430**. It was a year of growth and investment in our teams and equipment, leaving us with net assets of **\$10,173,325**.




EXPENSES




